DEAR THIENSVILLE RESIDENTS,

The tax bill that is sent to you will be in a self-contained envelope that is folded and sealed. Sewer Utility Bills will be mailed around the 15th of December. SEPARATE CHECKS FOR TAXES, SEWER UTILITY AND PET LICENSES ARE NECESSARY, DO NOT COMBINE THEM ON ONE CHECK.

The Village Board has adopted the 2012 budget with the resulting expenditures and revenues shown below. The Capital Equipment/Improvement Fund budget is \$934,763. \$3,400 for the Old Village Hall Fund and \$39,235 has been included for the Storm Water Management Fund, which is mandated by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. This fund manages storm water quality, not quantity. The budget, as adopted, will continue to provide village services as in past years.

The tax rate for village purposes is \$7.473343 per thousand assessed. The village levy increased by 0.69%. Below is a comparison of assessed tax rates of 2010 to 2011 and the net change by agency. The village share of tax dollars will be \$.37 cents of each dollar the taxpayer will pay in 2011 taxes. The net tax rate is \$18.560 per thousand assessed which is a \$0.512 per thousand decrease on assessed value for all taxing agencies. Below is the tax dollar distribution, tax rates and changes by agencies.





Dear Thiensvillians:

Writing this last newsletter article as village president is indeed “bitter sweet” as the expression goes. It has been a joy to serve on the village board for nearly fourteen years. That doesn’t mean every second was a party, but the overall experience was a joy.

The second big factor in being able to achieve these goals has been our ability to tap the money coming to the village through the TIF money which the community will receive for a few more years. However, that will come to an end, taxes will likely go down at that time, and the village will need to be positioned for the future. Currently, we have been very cautious about not lowering taxes with TIF money because in a few years it will not be there.

The Thiensville and Mequon communities along with the Chamber and school district have been engaged in a community conversation. Indeed, the success of these entities are clearly linked. I suspect Thiensville will grow stronger as the years pass. With the wonderful Weyenberg Library and the Mequon-Thiensville School District, how can we go wrong! If we take pride in our property, are kind to our many older citizens, support the children always, and generally extend a helping hand to those around us, Thiensville will be super.

For Carol and me, we will see you even after the village service is over in April. Hopefully, I’ll be allowed to continue my county service, and we continue to believe there are wonderful opportunities ahead.

LOTTERY CREDIT NOTICE

The lottery credit is applied to real estate tax bills where property owners have certified that they resided in the residence on January 1, 2011. The credit amount on your tax bill is based on the Mequon/Thiensville School tax rate. If you buy or sell a home, the lottery credit remains with the property. Ideally, the amount of the credit should be considered when pro-rating the property taxes between the buyer and the seller. If you missed the pre-certification deadline, contact the Thiensville Treasurer's office for a late claim form no later than January 31, 2012.

REAL ESTATE TAX PAYMENT PLAN

Property owners may elect to utilize the real estate tax installment plan by paying their taxes according to the following schedule:

Tax Payments Made in 2011

Taxpayers desiring an extra income tax deduction for 2011 must pay the tax bill by December 31, 2011 or, if paid by mail, the envelope must be postmarked on or before December 31, 2011. No exceptions will be made. The office will be open until noon on December 30, 2011.

Tax Due Dates

1st Half of Net Tax Bill due January 31, 2012 made payable to the **Village of Thiensville**.

2nd Half of Net Tax Bill due July 31, 2012 made payable to the **Ozaukee County Treasurer**.

If the installment plan is not utilized, full payment is due January 31, 2012.

No postdated checks will be accepted. Checks will be processed when they are received. Postdated checks will be returned to the taxpayer.

A penalty in the amount of 1-1/2% per month will be assessed on the balance due from February 1st.

Refund checks resulting from payment in excess of taxes owed will not be issued at the counter. A refund check will be mailed within ten working days from receipt of the tax payment. There will be no cash refunds over \$100. If you would like an immediate refund, you may pay at Harris Bank or Bank Mutual.

PAYING TAXES AT HARRIS BANK AND BANK MUTUAL THIENSVILLE BRANCHES ONLY

Harris Bank, located at 201 N. Main Street, Thiensville and Thiensville Bank Mutual, located at 208 N. Main Street will collect taxes and will issue refunds while you wait for payments in excess of the amount owed. Exceptions to normal banking hours are:

Tidbits from the President

Ozaukee County 2011 Economic Indicator Report

Ozaukee Economic Development has issued its 2011 report. The conclusions appear below. For more of the very interesting details, you may contact their office at 262-268-7730.

Conclusions:

The indicators in the 2011 report were notable in that they began to reflect the impacts of the severe recession plaguing the Nation from 2008-2010. The data available in 2011 was typically information from that period of time and reflected the tumultuous economic times. The per capita personal income, median annual household income, and number of jobs in Ozaukee County fell slightly from years prior, while wages paid by County employers continued to fall. The good news is that the economy is beginning to recover from the recession, and next year's numbers should reflect those improvements.

The 2011 indicators did reveal ongoing Ozaukee economic trends. Ozaukee County residents continue to enjoy a very high per capita personal income and median annual household income, while experiencing lower levels of unemployment and poverty rates than the State and regional average. However, Ozaukee County residents continue to seek the high-paying jobs to help them maintain their high level of income outside of the County. The percentage of County residents seeking employment outside Ozaukee County continues to rise, as the wages paid by Ozaukee County employers are consistently lower than those paid by the nearby counties of Milwaukee and Waukesha.

Some additional bright spots in the 2011 indicators were an improvement in Ozaukee County's standing with regards to location quotients for some higher-skilled industries. Ozaukee County improved its location quotients relative to the State of Wisconsin base area in the industries of Professional & Technical Services; Health Care & Social Assistance; and Educational Services. These fields typically pay the higher wages and require the higher levels of educational attainment of Ozaukee County residents. Continued efforts by Ozaukee Economic Development to attract businesses that pay living wages and require the higher levels of education and training of Ozaukee County residents should positively impact these location quotients into the future.

Under the Radar

Wisconsin lawmaking is often done, not with individual bills, but in the state budget. The length and complexity of the budget means this activity often goes unnoticed. The 2011-13 edition is no exception. Among its many actions, it:

- Ends the public financing system for campaigns in the state;
- Makes major regulatory changes affecting the alcohol industry and small brewers;
- Further empowers state health officials to seek changes in Medicaid;
- Largely exempts manufacturing and agriculture from future income taxes;
- Increases the dollar threshold at which various building projects receive greater state scrutiny or require bidding;
- Raises the dollar limit below which actions are considered "small claims";
- Requires retirement contributions from new hires in police and fire arbitrations;
- Implements five-year vesting for new hires covered by state retirement; and
- Liberalizes restrictions on working hours for minors under child labor laws.

The most recent data from the U.S. Census shows that Wisconsin has 50.4 state and local government employees per 1,000 residents. The national average for all 50 states is 54.7. We are 7.9 percent below average and rank 43rd among the 50 states.

According to the Wisconsin Taxpayers Alliance (WTA), Wisconsin state and local governments have a total of 283,351 full-time equivalent employees, with 24 percent working in state government and the remaining 76 percent employed by local governments, including school districts.

RADON TESTING

Radon is a gas which can accumulate in buildings. Test kits are available after January 1, 2012 free of charge at the Ozaukee County Health Department. Winter is a good time for testing because a home needs to be closed.

The danger of radon is that it is a factor in lung cancer and is even more dangerous in settings where people are smoking.

We are told that realtors are recommending radon testing at the time of sale, so one might just as well have the test and if needed treat the situation thus having the ongoing health benefits.

If you need to get the situation treated, be sure to use a state certified company.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Thiensville Police Department exists to protect our citizens and the quality of life in Thiensville. We are asking that you make the effort to help us keep you safe and the quality of life high in the community. Simple things which cost nothing can be a big help to all of us.

Buckle up when you drive and make sure all of your passengers do the same. Seatbelts are truly lifesavers if you are involved in an accident.

Be attentive when you are driving. Keep your mind on the traffic and activities going on around you. Talking on a cell phone, texting and tweeting are all activities which take your attention away from your driving. Survey results and tests have shown drivers who are doing any of these activities have impairment almost as great as a driver with a blood alcohol level of .08% the legal limit for intoxication in Wisconsin. Please direct your attention to the traffic around you.

Keep your vehicles and home safe from intrusion. When you are away from either one make sure they are locked and never leave keys for either one accessible. This simple action will greatly reduce your chances of being a crime victim.

Internet scams are continually changing but all operate on the same premise. Someone is trying to get money from you with a promise of huge financial rewards. When someone calls, emails or sends you mail with a request for a little money to help them now so they can pay you a large return in the future you are being scammed.

Our advise to you is to terminate the contact and never send money or give out any personal information which could compromise your banking or credit accounts. As we have said many times before, "if it seems too good to be true, it is too good to be true."

Darkness seems to come earlier each day and we ask you to be careful if you are out during the hours of darkness doing any number of things. If you are out for a walk, walking the dog, jogging or working outside take precautions to make yourself visible. Many manufacturers now make clothing with striping reflectors or LED lights embedded in their products. Flashlights or warning lights are also great tools to help people see you. If you are going to be out after dark consider using them to make yourself more visible. If you are walking on a street that does not have a sidewalk you should walk facing oncoming traffic but please use sidewalks whenever possible.

We are often asked about the requirements for posting signs for an activity or event you or a group are conducting and want to advertise. Any person may post signs for an event on their property as long as they are not in village right of way. You may also post signs on someone else's property if you have the property owner's permission to do so. Signs cannot be posted in any village right of way or on any utility pole or traffic sign. The area between any sidewalk and curb is village right of way and signs cannot be posted in this area. If you have questions placement of signs call the police department with any questions.

We all hate to see what the price of gasoline will be next. Gone are the days when you could fill your tank for a reasonable price. One gas saving tip we offer is to shop locally. Many Thiensville businesses have just the product you are looking for. Support the local business community and save on fuel costs for yourself. A vibrant business community depends on local support. Please do your part.

We strive to make the village a safe place to live, work, shop and play. Please help us to keep the village the wonderful place it has always been.

MEQUON-THIENSVILLE JUNIOR WOMEN'S CLUB

The Thiensville Police Department was recently selected as the Mequon-Thiensville Junior Women's Club recipient of a \$5,000 donation from the club's philanthropic committee. The money will be used by the police department to purchase new automated external defibrillators for the department.

The generous donation that Chief Richard Preston submitted an application for will allow the department to purchase three new defibrillators, one for each of the departments patrol vehicles. These new "Zoll" units will include the latest in automatic external defibrillator technology and will also be fully compatible with the Thiensville Fire Department equipment. The defibrillators will assist anyone with cardiac distress.

Chief Preston says he cannot thank the Junior Women's Club enough for their generosity. With tight budget restrictions and limited tax revenue the anticipated replacement date for the outdated units now in service would have been 2014 but this donation will allow the department to obtain new units in 2012.

The Junior Women's Club has also been a longtime supporter of the departments Safety Town program. They have provided refreshments for students and staff at this annual program for a number of years. Their support in this area is another example of their community support and dedication.

Funds for the new defibrillators are a result of the club's annual Thanksgiving Day "Turkey Trot" which is held in Thiensville each year and has supported many local projects and programs in the Thiensville-Mequon community.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Happy Holidays and warm winter greetings to you! Here's some winter fire and health safety tips to ensure you have a safe and warm winter.

For pet parents, keep cats indoors and ensure your dog has protection from the wind and access to warm shelter. Wash off road salt from paws with warm water, and keep anti-freeze properly stored since it is toxic to your pets and children. Consider jackets or sweaters for small breed dogs.

When dressing babies and young children for cold weather wrap them in multiple layers and don't forget the hats. Almost 40% of winter heat loss is through our heads. Stay warm and dry to avoid hypothermia or frostbite. If you suspect hypothermia, go inside, remove wet clothing, have a warm drink, and wrap up in warm clothes and blankets. Consider calling 911 if symptoms of drowsiness, weakness, confusion, slurred speech or uncontrollable shivering are present.

Frostbite usually affects fingers, toes, ears, lips, and the nose. Early signs include patches of skin that are pale, cold, and dry, along with burning, numbness or aching. Go indoors and soak the area with warm water - DO NOT rub the frozen area(s). If you see blisters or blackening of the skin, get medical attention immediately.

When traveling, wear layers, and keep an emergency kit along with blankets and foot/hand warmers in your vehicle. If stranded, stay in the car if there is no immediate life-threatening danger and phone 911 for help.

In your home, keep holiday candles away from drapery, furniture, or other combustible materials. Kerosene heaters should have an emergency shut off and only be used with appropriate venting and with the fuel recommended by the manufacturer. Any and all flammable liquids should be stored in approved metal containers in well ventilated storage areas outside the home and away from children and pets.

Wood stoves and fireplaces should be clear from combustible surfaces. Get annual chimney inspections and use metal or glass fireplace doors to avoid spark fires and injury to pets or children. Don't use flammable liquids to start or accelerate your fire. Before bedtime, make sure the fireplace fire and ashes are out, the damper is open and the doors are closed.

Make sure your furnace has been inspected and is operating properly. All furnace controls and emergency shutoffs should be in proper working condition. Keep trash and combustibles away from your heating system.

As always have a working smoke alarm and a carbon monoxide detector in every level of your home and check it for proper operation on a monthly basis.

Dog and cat license fees must be paid **ONLY** at the Thiensville Municipal Building. The banks will not accept dog and cat license fees.

Un-neutered Male or Un-spayed Female \$13.00

Neutered Male or Spayed Female \$ 8.00

(After April 1, 2012 a \$5.00 late fee will be added to the above fees.)

A current rabies immunization statement from a veterinarian **must** be presented at the time the license is applied for.

By village ordinance it is unlawful to harbor more than 3 dogs or 4 cats in any residence.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION

Several years ago the H.P.C. started a historic marking plaque program to help identify and preserve our remaining historic buildings. This year's plaque award went to one of Thiensville's most outstanding historic buildings.

This beautiful art deco style building was designed by Albert Moorman and built in 1929 for the second location of the Thiensville State Bank and is located at 118 Green Bay Road.

The building is now known as the River Bank Building and is owned by Rick Fagan. Rick has done an outstanding job of preserving not only the outside of the building but has restored the interior to its near original condition.

This building was built on the site of the previous building. The first being the home of Henry John Thien who was the son of Village namesake John Henry Thien.

The second building was the home of Peter Kroehnke who bought the mill from Henry John and tore down his home and built a new home. This building still stands but was moved 100 feet west of the bank building.

You can find out more about our history by getting a copy of our historic self-guided walking tour booklet. Take the tour and see if you can locate all the buildings that have received a historic marking plaque. Walking tour booklets are available at the Village Hall for the price of \$3.00.



MEQUON-THIENSVILLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Mequon Historical Society, which was formed in 1987 with the help of the former Mequon Men's Club, has changed its name. At its recent annual meeting, the society's membership voted unanimously to change its name to the Mequon-Thiensville Historical Society.

The new name reflects the common roots that both Thiensville and Mequon enjoy. The Town of Mequon was established in 1846. Thiensville became a village in 1910, and the remaining Town of Mequon became an incorporated city in 1957.

The Mequon-Thiensville Historical Society is located in the Logemann Community Center on Mequon Road. The Society's offices are open every Thursday afternoon from 2-5 PM for historical or genealogical research. Other times are available upon request.

Christmas trees will be picked up the same day as your garbage pickup for up to three weeks after Christmas. Place trees at front of curb. For condominiums, the private contracted haulers will pick up the trees.

LIQUID BRINE AND GEO-MELT USED FOR WINTER SNOW AND ICE CONTROL

In 2010, the Village of Thiensville started using Geo-Melt, which is an organic based beet juice that helps with ice and snow removal from public streets with minimal environmental impact. Public Works staff designed and built a brine blending station which is now an integral component of the Village's winter storm response program. The facility has a series of piping and valves blending liquid salt brine with geo-melt and calcium chloride, based upon weather and temperature conditions. This mixture is sprayed on the streets prior to a winter storm and provides a liquid base under the snow or ice, which results in a speedy breakdown and clearing of the streets, even in sub-zero weather. The liquid is also applied to rock salt, which must still be used in responding to winter storms. The use of brine, however, has substantially reduced the amount of rock salt that must be used to respond to winter storm conditions, not only saving substantial sums of money, but also minimizing the adverse environmental impacts of using rock salt on the public streets.
